The Society received an unexpected and very welcome package recently! A 1731 Court document was returned to Hanover by a descendant of a Union soldier who most likely picked it up as a souvenir in 1865. James Copple of the 62<sup>nd</sup> Illinois did not fight in Virginia, but marched through Richmond on his way to Washington, DC to participate in the Grand Review on May 24. According to Frank D. Hargrove Jr., Clerk of the Circuit Court, this is the only known record of its kind that pre-dates 1865 and is now the oldest record in the Clerk's office. It chronicles the Court day of 5 Nov 1731 and contains nearly 100 names. See abstracts of the 1731 Court document on pages 5-6 of the *Bulletin*.


Lafayette Returns to Hanover! Sunday, May 19 at 3 p.m. Hanover Tavern's Bradley Theater
