



Recent Acquisitions

The Society has received two unique donations since the beginning of the year.

One is the February 1931 issue of *The American Architect*, donated by the estate of James L. Deck Jr. The issue features a description and drawings of the historic Hanover Courthouse. See the *Bulletin*, page 3-4, for the article and drawings by architect Beaufort N. Eubank.

The other is a cache of documents is from Heritage & History of Hanover County Inc., the organization behind the book, *Nature's Bounty, Nation's Glory*. When the group dissolved after publication, the Society was not only gifted the remaining inventory of books, but also recently received the notes collected by and for the author Martha McCartney.

As expected, topics vary widely, including agriculture, education, transportation, religion, Native American Indians, African-Americans, military events, old homes, and archeological investigations. Although a good portion of the material is familiar, there is lesser-known information which will appear in future *Bulletin* articles.



An unusual photograph in the *Nature's Bounty* collection is labeled "Mother, Elvira and Pearley Carver." The photo, developed in Richmond by the Hall Optical Co., is likely from the early 20th century based on their clothing. If you have information about this Carver
